A small-production winery that strives to make the finest German-style wines in Oregon. The climate in Germany’s Mosel region, famed for producing some of the world’s finest Rieslings, is ideal because of its cooler growing climate, which allows the fruit to hang longer on the vines without over ripening. A longer hang time gives the fruit more time to pull up complex flavors from the soil. Therefore, the vineyard sites Teutonic sources its fruit in Oregon are located in cooler areas and at higher elevations. They only work with dry-farmed vineyards (non-irrigated farms) so that the roots grow deep into the earth, drilling through many layers of soil strata, absorbing the various mineral components from the terroir. The Teutonic house style is represented by wines that are lower in alcohol (typically 9% to 12% alcohol by volume), and higher in acidity. Wines with this profile are more elegant, have greater nuance, and pair well with many foods. Only neutral barrels are used so the flavor of oak will not be found in our wines, which can overpower some delicate flavors in certain dishes.



2021/2022 Teutonic ‘Candied Mushroom’ Riesling

Crow Valley Vd., Willamette Valley

The 2022 vintage of our famous 100% Dry Riesling. Inspired by David Chang’s sense of umami, this is one of the best Rieslings we make. We refer to it as our umami tsunami! The fruit comes from Crow Valley Vineyard in Southern Willamette Valley. We’ve been lucky that the fruit has consistently come with botrytis, also called Noble Rot, which concentrates the flavors when the grapes dehydrate on the vine and get fuzzy from the mold (good kind of mold).

Pear Blossom Vineyard, Columbia George

The Columbia Gorge AVA is getting more attention these days as a notable growing site, both on the Oregon and Washington side. Pear Blossom Vineyard is in Washington, located on Underwood Mountain with an elevation between 1200 and 1300 feet and is on a south facing slope. Pear Blossom vineyard is 18 acres total with 16 of them planted with vines and pear trees, thus the name, Pear Blossom Vineyard. It dry farmed, which is our requirement when purchasing fruit. By not watering the vines, it forces the roots to grow deeper into the earth, pushing through various layers of soil strata and picking up more complex flavors which express themselves through the fruit giving the wines a better expression of place-terroir. This is your everyday Riesling.



2022 Teutonic 'Seafoam' White Wine, Alsea Vineyard

Alsea Vineyard was planted in 2005 by Barnaby and Olga Tuttle. The tiny town of Alsea is located 19 miles from the Pacific Ocean as a crow flies. The winters are very cold and wet, and the summers hot and dry, but cool at night. The soil is rich with iron and the roots of the vines pickup on this characteristic, making Alsea wines reflect the terroir of the vineyard so well. Wild yeast was collected from the vineyard site (pied de Cuvee) and it was fermented in neutral oak barrels.

2021 Teutonic Pinot Noir, Willamette Valley

Every year we look forward to harvesting Crow Valley Vineyard. It gives us beautiful fruit and gorgeous Pinot Noir. As this wine ages (not that long) the acid recedes and quite frankly, a delightful acid driven, fruity Pinot emerges, touched by Bing cherries, spearmint and earth. Crow Valley Vineyard, a 16-acre, dry-farmed vineyard in the southern Willamette Valley, this Pinot Noir is medium bodied, with tart red fruit and bright acidity.

Laurel Vineyard, Chehalem Mountains

Laurel Vineyard sits at the top of Bald Peak at 1250' elevation. Owner and vineyard manager, John Albin, specifically planted this Alsatian varietal for his sparkling program. When Barnaby found out some of this fruit was available, he couldn't wait to get some and work with it. The original vines were transported in a suitcase from Alsace to Oregon by Charles Coury in 1965. We have been making Pinot Noir and Rosé with this fruit for 12 years now and we couldn't be happier with it.

Delivers the typical characteristics of this vineyard, lighter colored but deep in aromatics of bright fruit notes of cherry and white raspberry with a slight dusting of chalkiness. The finish is long and keeps your palate reminded of what you just sipped until the next taste. This wine is light enough to pair with seafood and can hold up to pork and beef. **Vegan!**
